From Ban Jelačić square take tram line 6 or 13

heading east to tram station Glavni kolodvor where you need to swith to tram line 2 and go to tram station Getaldićeva where you need to switch to bus line 236 which will take you to the bus station Kampus fakultet right in front of the Faculty.

From Zagreb main train station get on tram line

TRAM & BUS

From Ban Jelačić square take tram line 14 heading west to tram station Trnsko, right in front of the venue building.

From Zagreb main train station, you can take the bus line 234 which will take you to bus station ZG Velesajam, very near the venue building. To get to the bus station Glavni kolodvor head west from the main train station, down into the Importanne Galerija shopping center and then south through the passageway under the railroad lines. It is a 5 minute walk.

From Zagreb main bus station, you can take the tram line 7 heading south and stop at tram station Trnsko, right in front of the venue building.



WAYS TO BUY TICKETS IN ZAGREB (ZET SYSTEM)





1. Moj ZET Mobile App (Digital Tickets)

- Download the Moj ZET app (available for both Android and iOS)
- Sign up using your email and a password.
- Add funds to your in-app balance.
- Purchase digital tickets and validate them by scanning the QR code or using NFC next to the vehicle's entrance. App shows remaining validity time, and you can register transfers like "I'm changing vehicle." A controller can scan your active ticket on your screen

2. Physical Tickets

YOU CAN BUY PAPER TICKETS IN SEVERAL PLACES:

- Newsstands (like Tisak, iNovine)
- ZET ticket offices
- Onboard from drivers (cash only, sometimes no change)

TICKET TYPES AND PRICES VARY:

- **30-minute ticket:** ~€0.53 when bought in advance; ~€0.80 onboard (first tariff zone)
- **60-minute ticket:** ~€0.93 (paper ticket)
- 90-minute ticket: ~€1.33 (paper) or via stored-value card
- All-day ticket: €3.98 for unlimited rides within Zone 1 for the whole day

Multi-day passes:

- 3-day: €9.29
- 7-day: €19.91
- 15-day: €26.54
- 30-day: €53.09



2. LENUCI HORSESHOE

This remarkable 19th-century patchwork of squares and parks is home to numerous scientific and cultural institutions, and represents the high point of Zagreb urban planning.




3. DOLAC

Zagreb's biggest and most charming farmers' market, Dolac is a colourful display of local fruit, vegetables and quality produce from all around Croatia.



1. ST MARK'S SQUARE

The square is home to the Croatian Government, Parliament and Constitutional Court. But as graceful and stately as these buildings are, they take a back seat to the stunningly pretty St Mark's Church, which in part dates from the mid 13th century.




4. MIROGOJ

More than a burial ground, this stunning cemetery is also a serene oasis and an open-air sculpture park.



5. FUNICULAR

The world's shortest cable railway used for public transport, Zagreb's funicular has been connecting the Upper and Lower **EuSARF** Towns since 1890.



6. MAKSIMIR

Opened in 1794, Maksimir is the oldest and, according to many locals, the most beautiful of Zagreb's parks. It is landscaped in the English style, with several lakes, pavilions, and the accompanying Zagreb Zoo.



7. THE CATHEDRAL


This largest sacral building in Croatia has been rebuilt many times since its inception in the 13th century. It assumed its present Neo-Gothic look in the 19th century.

10. MEDVEDNICA

The northernmost parts of Zagreb lie at the foot of Mount Medvednica - a pristine nature park and a favourite local day-trip destination.



pedestrianized stretch between Ban Jelačić Square and Petar Preradović Square (also known as Flower Square) is Zagreb's celebrated coffee strip. The inviting café terraces serve as a vast open-air living room, and epitomize Zagreb's coffeedrinking culture.





9, LOTRŠČAK **TOWER**

One of the bestpreserved parts of Zagreb's erstwhile fortifications, Lotrščak Tower also houses the Grič cannon, which is fired every day at noon.



Zagreb's museums boast artworks of all ages and

Zagreb's museums boast artworks of all ages and styles: from ancient Roman and Greek to medieval, from traditional to contemporary, from the expert to the naive, from the brutal to the tender. On top of that, lovers of street art can enjoy a parallel world of the imagination that thrives out of doors and outside official institutions.

ARCHEOLOGICAL MUSEUM

Quite apart from being housed in a splendid historic palace on one of Zagreb's prettiest squares, the Archeological Museum is a must-visit attraction on account of its rare and valuable collections. Visitors will be particularly impressed by the famous Linen Book of Zagreb – a strip of linen inscribed with the longest surviving text in the ancient Etruscan language. The recently restored Egyptian mummy is another of the museum's high points.





CROATIAN MUSEUM OF NAÏVE ART

The permanent collection of this museum includes masterpieces by Croatia's greatest naïve painters and sculptors. Artwork from the renowned Hlebine School is included, alongside pieces by foreign naïve artists active in the period between the 1930s and the late 1980s.

ETHNOGRAPHIC MUSEUM

The museum's permanent display boasts national costumes from all around Croatia, alongside objects representing non-European cultures brought back to Zagreb by Croatian explorers. Temporary exhibitions focus on everyday rituals in attractive and accessible ways.

CROATIAN HISTORY MUSEUM

Established in 1846, the museum archives, interprets and displays Croatian heritage from the Middle Ages to the present day.





TECHNICAL MUSEUM NIKOLA TESLA

A must for every science and technology buff, this museum is also the right address for eager learners. One of the highlights is the replica of Nikola Tesla's laboratory, where visitors can enjoy daily demonstrations of his inventions. The museum also features a 300-metre-long recreation of a mine, portraying the extraction of coal and ferrous and non-ferrous metals.

MUSEUM OF ARTS AND CRAFTS

Since it opened in 1880, the museum has strived to protect artisans and craftspeople from the onslaught of massproduced goods. This is the best place to explore Croatia's material culture.





ZAGREB CITY MUSEUM

Opened in 1907, the museum recounts the history of the Zagreb region in epic style – from prehistory right up to the present moment. The exhibition offers an eclectic look at Zagreb's past, taking in political events as well as popular culture and the arts. Objects are presented in a visually engaging manner, revealing the richness of Zagreb's history and shedding light on the everyday life of its inhabitants.

ZC GETTING AROUND THE CITY

MEŠTROVIĆ ATELIER

Work by renowned sculptor Ivan Meštrović is displayed in an attractive gallery just around the corner from St Mark's Church. This authentic space was the artist's home and studio and today boasts numerous sculptures in marble, stone, wood and bronze as well as reliefs, drawings and prints. It is an excellent introduction to Meštrović's rich and varied career.

MODERN GALLERY

The museum's collections include more than 750 paintings, sculptures, medals and works in new media. This exceptional display contains the crème de la crème of Croatia's fine arts, from the 19th century onwards.

KLOVIĆEVI DVORI GALLERY

Housed in the delicate 17thcentury building of a former Jesuit monastery, this gallery focuses primarily on fine arts. It is also a major go-to place for artistic and cultural events, such as high-profile exhibitions, workshops and lectures.



MIMARA MUSEUM

Art collectors Ante and Wiltrude Topić Mimara built a large private collection featuring major artworks dating from antiquity to the 20th century. The Mimara Museum was founded when the couple donated their collection to the City of Zagreb.





MUSEUM OF BROKEN RELATIONSHIPS

This formerly roving exhibition of donated objects is one of Zagreb's most popular museums. It investigates failed relationships of all kinds by gathering intimate memorabilia from people around the world. The founders are Zagreb artists who were once a couple themselves: the idea for the museum was born when their own relationship ended and something had to be done with their joint possessions. After a successful world tour during which many more objects were donated, the exhibition found a permanent home in Zagreb's Upper Town. It received the Kenneth Hudson award for the most innovative museum in Europe in 2011.



ZG GETTING AROUND THE CITY

VATROSLAV LISINSKI CONCERT HALL

Named after the composer of the first Croatian opera, this concert hall is one of the Zagreb cultural scene's premier venues. An impressive number of world-renowned artists have performed here, from ensembles such as the Bolshoi Theatre, the Scala Philharmonic Orchestra from Milan, the Vienna Philharmonic and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra from London, to soloists including Luciano Pavarotti, Jośe Carreras and Montserrat Caballé. Apart from the great classical names, Lisinski has also welcomed leading stars of pop, jazz and avant-garde music, such as Nick Cave, Tina Turner and Ella Fitzgerald.



ART PAVILION

Originally built to serve as the Croatian Pavilion at the 1896 Budapest Millennial Exhibition, this imposing structure hosts headline exhibitions by prominent international artists. One of the first prefabricated buildings in Croatia, it is today one of the many unmissable attractions along the route of Lenuci Horseshoe.





ACADEMY OF MUSIC

The oldest music college in Croatia, the Academy has seen many world-class musicians pass through its doors. Its students and graduates have performed at countless concerts, shows and events, both in-house and in concert halls across the city. In 2014 the Academy moved to a flashy new home – a building distinguished by a unique roof displaying in the colours of the rainbow.

CROATIAN NATIONAL THEATRE

The monumental, historic building of the Croatian National Theatre was unveiled in 1895, and merits a visit for its architectural features alone. It also offers a rich programme of first-class opera, drama and ballet, and a performance here is guaranteed to be an unforgettable experience.





CROATIAN MUSIC INSTITUTE

The Croatian Music Institute is housed in an 1876 building, which is also home to Zagreb's oldest concert hall. This is where top-notch chamber music is performed, most notably because of the room's exceptional acoustics.
